Concert attire:

Goals for the year:

Have FUN, learn some new skills, better understand the building blocks of music, increase an appreciation for the importance of music in our lives, and be a part of the awesome and tremendously successful Grand Rapids Band program!

Grading

Band is a performance-based class and grades will reflect individual musical progress as well as the ability to perform benchmarks at grade level. Students will be asked to demonstrate skills and improvement throughout the year. A basic proficiency level will be expected of ALL students, and opportunities to demonstrate more advanced skills will be given as well. In addition to basic skill assessments, students will receive a weekly grade based on their rehearsal performance. This grade will include being responsible, respectful and ready to learn during rehearsals. Concerts are a significant part of our performance grades, so please put them on the calendar as early as possible.

Home Practice:

Students will not be graded on the amount of time spent practicing outside of school, but will be asked to do a self-assessment of their practice sessions/music skills twice a unit. The goal is to have all students increase their awareness of their own playing ability, and promote independent learning. There will be various practice incentives throughout the school year.

SmartMusic is a digital/on-line home practice tool that can be used on computers as well as iPads. SmartMusic is a yearly subscription; you can find more information at: www.smartmusic.com. Essential Elements, book 2 will be the primary learning text

for 7th grade. Percussion use Alfred Drum Method book 1, and Fresh Approach to Mallets. Home practice should be out of lesson books, concert music, and any online music students are interested in playing. There are many sites that have free sheet music, often for popular songs that the kids might find fun to try!

Supplies:

If your child needs reeds, valve oil, cork grease, drum sticks, 1" 3 ring binder, etc, those items can be purchased at the school store. You can also ask your band director for other supply sources.

Requirement for class:

- 1. Students are required to have a 1" 3 ring binder to hold all of their music. It is their responsibility to take care of and bring this to class everyday.
- 2. Bring your instrument daily to class!
- 3. Wind students need to purchased the Essential Elements book 2 for daily use in class.
- 4. Percussionists must purchase Timpani OR Yarn Mallets.

 Timpani = Vic Firth T1 Mallets = Mike Balter Blue Medium Yarn Mallets

Recommendations for Reeds:

Clarinets:

La Voz, Mitchell Lurie, Vandoren are all good brands. Should be playing on a med. soft (2 1/2) to medium (3)

Alto Sax/Tenor Sax:

La Voz, Vandoren, Hemke are all good brands.

Should be playing on a med. soft (2 1/2) to a medium (3)

Bari Sax

Bari brand plastic reeds are longer lasting and more durable for bari players. A medium works well for most students. (These may need to be ordered on-line) The brand is "Bari"

Bass Clarinets:

LaVoz are fine; a 2 or 2 1/2 work best.

• Oboe/bassoon:

The best bet is to find someone that makes their own reeds, and will make them for you. Here are a few that you may want to contact:

Recommendations for valve/slide oil:

• Trumpets, Baritones and Tubas:

Blue Juice valve oil: One bottle should last for a couple of years if used properly. <u>Put your name on the bottle with a permanent marker</u>. Petroleum Jelly works fine for tuning slides. Commercial tuning slide grease is fine, too.

• <u>Trombones:</u>

Yamaha slide oil works very well, and should be used **sparingly**. It costs about \$10 per bottle, but if used properly should last at least for a year. <u>Put your name on the bottle with a permanent marker</u>. Yamaha slide cream works well, but students need to make sure they are using the water misting bottle to keep the slide moving. Tuning slide can be grease with petroleum jelly. Commercial tuning slide grease is fine, too.

• French Horns:

Holton rotor valve oil works well. Tuning slides can be greased with petroleum jelly or slide grease. Commercial tuning slide grease is fine, too.
